
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# The Shipwrecked Sailor: An Egyptian Tale With Hieroglyphs





### Synopsis

This story is based on one found on a papyrus scroll of hieroglyphs from the nineteenth century B.C., Egypt. It tells the tale of a voyage on the Red Sea to a mysterious and enchanted land of riches located south of Egypt. On his way to the King's gold mines, a sailor is shipwrecked on a magic island, the Island of the Soul. Not long after he arrives, a gigantic serpent with scales of gold appears and reveals to the sailor that he is the Prince of Punt, and is also a lone survivor. The two become good friends, but one day a ship comes to rescue the sailor. Bearing gifts from the Prince, the sailor returns to Egypt with full hands, and a full heart. This is a tale of the surprising (and fortuitous) bonds that unite us, and of the good that comes to us when we least expect it. Tamara Bower's lush illustrations are rendered in Egyptian style, and phrases from the story appear in hieroglyphs with their literal translations.

There are hieroglyphs translating some of the story. The illustrator, Tamara Bower, includes explanations on the symbols she uses in the artwork and a detailed history of the Pharaoh's gold mines in Nubia and Punt. Things both GOOD and BAD. The story is a fairy tale, but a real one from Ancient Egypt, about a sailor who is shipwrecked on a mythical island. There he meets an empathetic serpent who befriends him and predicts that he will be rescued. When the sailor is finally rescued, he spreads the serpent's good name to the Pharaoh and shares the wealth of the island with him. The plot is great, it is short and sweet--easy for any age to enjoy between preschooler and fifth grade. My kids were kind of surprised to see a NICE serpent in a story! They loved the sublesson about hieroglyphics, and it was great that the author included a map and backstory about the fairy tale. My older kids enjoyed reading those parts. My little kids asked for this story again and again, and we all appreciated the artwork each time. If you're looking for a family friendly, age friendly, good piece of literature for Ancient Egypt, this is it. No objectionable sections, language, or political/religious stuff.

This is an engaging story about a very lucky sailor! It is nice to find a story that doesn't villainize snakes too. The snake is the good guy! I think it's nice to introduce children to stories from history and around the world.
